## City to See Partial Relief from Excessive Fiscal Disparities Program Burden

For decades the City of Rogers has felt a disproportionate impact from the Metropolitan Fiscal Disparities program, a mandatory tax base sharing program whereby a portion of the Rogers tax base has been contributed to a Metropolitan pool to be used by other communities. The majority of those dollars leave Rogers permanently.

Rogers has lost a net 15-20% of its tax base annually to the program. This amounts to Rogers taxpayers losing more than \$1 million in revenue per year to this program for the last 10 years. Rogers has consistently ranked as first or second out of 180 jurisdictions with the highest percentage of tax base lost, resulting in a significant portion of local revenues left unavailable for the tax relief, or to fund local services.

While the Fiscal Disparities program does not affect how much the City spends as part of its annual budget, it absolutely impacts the City's tax rate as well as tax bills for individual property owners.

For the past five years, the City has worked with Senator Warren Limmer and Representative/House Majority Leader Joyce Peppin to pursue relief from these impacts. After years of hard work, documentation, one-on-one meetings and legislative committee testimony, those efforts paid off in 2017 with new legislation being adopted. Specifically, House Majority Leader Peppin achieved inclusion of Fiscal Disparities relief language in the 2017 House Omnibus Tax Bill, which

The City of Rogers begins plowing when snowfall reaches 2 inches, or when roadway conditions warrant a response by Public Works. Equipment dispatch is dependent upon timing and intensity, weather forecast, personnel and equipment availability, and street priority classification. The primary objective is to open streets to twoway traffic beginning with arterial and collector streets, and followed by local streets. Cul de sacs are generally opened by plowing the outside edge first, and full clearing within 24-48 hours.

Due to environmental concerns, sand/salt will be limited to steep grades, high volume intersections, school crossings, and icy patches on priority routes. Trails and sidewalks within arterial and collector streets, and those within school walking zones, will be plowed when accumulation exceeds 2 inches within a 24-hour period.

**Sidewalks:** Residents are responsible for clearing snow from sidewalks adjacent to their property within 24

## **Snow Removal From Around Fire Hydrants**

The Rogers Fire Department would like to ask residents of the City of Rogers, during your snow removal efforts this winter season to keep fire hydrants free from obstruction of snow.

As you shovel or push snow off your driveways and sidewalks, take time to clear the snow from around fire hydrants (three-foot radius).

During a fire, seconds count. The extra minute removing snow from around fire hydrants my save your neighbor's home or yours.

hours. Although primary responsibility lies with the resident, the City will assist as time and equipment allows. Priority walks, such as those leading to schools, will be cleared first.

**Parking:** The City of Rogers would like to remind residents that there is NO parking allowed on any City street from November 1st to March 31st between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. Vehicles found parked at these times, will be issued a citation and may be towed.

#### **Private Property Snow Removal:**

The City of Rogers reminds property owners that State Law prohibits shoveling snow or ice onto streets and highways. This not only creates unsafe driving conditions, it increases the cost of snow removal.

#### **Right-of-Way Obstructions:**

Items which are properly installed and allowed by ordinance will be considered for repair/replacement only if physically struck by a plow blade, wing, or other piece of plow equipment. Trees, shrubbery, landscaping, irrigation, and other items located within right-of-way will not be considered for compensation.


Mail/Paper boxes: Mail and paper boxes must be mounted a minimum of 46 inches above street level. Properly installed mailboxes will be considered for repair or replacement only if physi-

cally struck by snowplow equipment. Installations damaged by snow or ice coming from the plow blade will not be repaired or replaced. The City, the Fire Department, and Post Office are requesting that you help keep the area around your mailbox clear of snow. This will enable the postal carriers to deliver your mail without delay.

**Sod Damage:** When streets and sidewalks are covered with snow, it is almost impossible to determine the edge of the road or sidewalk. To minimize sod damage from plows, place brightly painted stakes just behind the curb or sidewalk.

Winter Driving: Allow ample room between your vehicle and snow removal equipment, and always assume the driver cannot see you. Do not pass until the plow has reached a safe clear area and never pass on the right side of the snowplow. Always assume that intersections, curves, bridges, and hills are slippery and drive according to road conditions.

Winter Fun: Discourage children from building snow forts at the street edge, or sliding from snow banks onto the roadway. Instruct children that snow removal vehicles are dangerous, and they should move away from the road until it has been cleared and the vehicle has moved from the vicinity.



## **Simplify Utility Bill Pay with ACH Direct**

Can't seem to remember when your utility payment is due? Tired of sending checks in the mail and hoping they get to the City on time? The City of Rogers offers a direct payment option (called ACH) in which you can have your utility payment paid automatically from your checking account. It's easy and still gives you control to cancel up to 3 business days prior to the due date.

How the ACH payment plan works:

- Fill out the form below authorizing utility payments to be made from your checking account
- After each billing cycle (every 2 months), you will receive your bill in the mail with your charges and the message "ACH DO NOT PAY"
- You can still review your bill and call City Hall with questions

- Payments will be made automatically on the due date which is the 10th of the month
- If you wish to cancel your ACH payment, notify City Hall at least 3 business days prior to the due date to ensure payment is not taken from your account
- Proof of payment will appear on your next mailed utility bill

Note: The authority you give to charge your account will remain in effect until you notify us in writing to terminate the authorization.

## Fiscal disparities relief... from page 1 was ultimately approved by both

houses and the Governor. This new legislation will result in additional funding to Rogers in the form of a distribution from the Statewide General Property Tax. The distribution will be in the range of \$575,000 to \$626,000 for 2018, approximately half of the City's annual revenue loss from the program.

City Council and staff routinely hear from passionate residents and groups regarding their hopes and priorities related to City spending, ranging from a desire for tax relief to additional services and amenities. These attitudes and desires help shape Council priorities and staff efforts. The balancing of these oftencompeting priorities will be part of what shapes Rogers as a desirable community with a strong identity and strong property values.

Rogers City Council is currently reviewing ways to implement these new "relief" dollars, including:

- The potential of lowering future property taxes, decreasing debt, and/or adding facilities, amenities, services.
- When to start programming for the relief dollars; funds will not be received until December 2018, and subsequent budget years

City property taxes and potential tax relief involves many factors: tax rate, current market value of your home, and any changes in your market value over the prior year. These factors influence the amount of relief, if any, that any individual property could receive.

The City Council will continue to discuss the best long-term use of this new funding as budget discussions progress.

## Are your smoke alarms too old?

Some of Rogers developments are now almost 10 years old, and so are the smoke alarms in those homes. Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years from the manufacture date. Over time, the sensors in the alarms become dusty and cloudy causing alarms to go off for no reason or to not sound when intended.

Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of your home, outside each sleeping area and inside each bedroom. There are two types of smoke alarms:

- Ionization detects flaming fires
- Photoelectrical detects smoldering fires.

It is recommended to use both types

or a combination alarm in your home. Smoke alarms should be tested monthly and batteries replaced every six months depending upon battery duration.

Carbon Monoxide alarms should be installed at least 10 feet from every sleeping area. Most often, carbon monoxide alarms are in the furnace area, which may not be heard when sleeping. It is recommended to purchase a carbon monoxide alarm with a digital read out. Carbon monoxide alarm replacement should follow manufacture guidelines as different brands vary.

# Seeking Paid on-call Firefighters

The Rogers Fire Department is currently accepting applications for paid-on-call firefighters in order to establish a hiring eligibility list. Rogers Fire responds to over 500 Fire/EMS calls each year covering the cities of Rogers, portions of Corcoran, and Otsego.

Firefighters are paid for responding to fire calls, training and meeting attendance, and are eligible for membership in the Rogers Fire Department Relief Pension Fund. Firefighters must be 18 years of age or older, possess a high school diploma or G.E.D., and hold a valid MN driver's license.

## **Crime Prevention**

The police department has responded to multiple reports of thefts at residences the past few months, and the losses are concerning to all of our residents. To protect your family from becoming a victim, we urge you to follow the following crime prevention tips:

- Consider purchasing a locking mailbox. Your mail contains items of value, correspondence with your personal information including bank account information and other identity details that are easily stolen and used. The consequences of these losses can be very time consuming and difficult to work through.
- Lock your vehicles when left unattended on the street, in your driveway and even in your garage. In almost every theft reported the vehicle had been left unlocked.
- **Do not leave valuables inside your car or truck.** Wallets, credit cards, cash, laptops and other valuables should be either locked, concealed or brought inside your home or business.
- **Keep garage doors closed and secure.** Make sure your vehicle is locked, if you keep a garage door opener inside your car.
- Lock garage entry doors, either exterior or interior, at night or when you are away from home.
- Illuminate the exterior of your home with exterior or landscape lighting.
- **Be vigilant and call 911** if you see anything suspicious in your neighborhood.

## **Here's How Organics Recycling Works**

Step 1: Discard food waste and food-soiled paper into a kitchen compost bucket, separate from your other household trash. You may use any sturdy washable container as a kitchen compost bucket. Consider using the 3 gallon Blue Bag Organics 100% BPI Compostable liner as well. Please don't use plastic shopping bags or other kinds of plastic bags. They will not compost.

**Step 2:** Empty your compost bucket into the 13-gallon Blue Bag Organics BPI-certified bag. All your household's organics, including flattened and folded pizza boxes, go into that special Blue Bag Organics liner.

**Step 3:** Hand tie the 13 gallon Blue Bag and place it inside your regular garbage cart for curb-side pickup. We'll



separate it from other trash at our facility. Only place 13 gallon BBO liners in the garbage cart. Smaller bags will not be collected.
