How long have you been a member? "It will be 9 Years in May."

How long have you lived in Rogers? "12 Years."

#### Why did you want to join the Rogers Fire Department?

"Honestly, I've never really wanted to be a 'Firefighter', but whenever passing an emergency scene I would find myself wondering if the Firefighters/Police 'need any help'. I decided to join the Rogers Fire Department because I thought I could be an asset to their team. I like helping people, solving problems, learning new skills, gaining life experience, and being a productive member of society. The final thing that pushed me to join the

fire department was the desire to have a greater sense of community so that Rogers isn't just part of my mailing address."

#### What is one important thing you want the public to know about the department?

"Paid on-call fire departments have come a long way from the 'good 'ol boys' clubs of years past. We are professional firefighters providing the same level of service as a full-time department. # What is your full time career outside of being a paid-on call firefighter?

"I am the VP of Operations for a supplier of Industrial Machinery. I help to solve problems and streamline the business to handle continued growth, while improving the overall quality experienced by our customers."

# What is one of your most memorable calls you've been

"On April 1st, 2015, we were paged out to 3 homes on fire in Otsego. One of our firefighters who lives in the neighborhood updated that it was actually 4 homes on fire...and multiple acres of wildland behind the homes. Between fighting the house fires and the DNR air planes dropping water right behind us, it was a once in a career experience."

# Can you tell us what you love about being a firefighter, and being on Rogers Fire Department?

"I love being behind the "caution tape" and working with a great team of people. We have a lot of laughs, but I know I can count on the person next to me when the tones sound and it's time to get serious."

# What would you say to someone who is on the fence about applying to become a firefighter?

"I strongly suggest scheduling a visit to ask any questions you have and to tour the fire station. If you still aren't sure, I'd be happy to have a candid conversation of what "a day in the life" looks like so there are no surprises. It's not all house fires, car accidents, and cats in trees; most calls are uneventful, winter is cold, and there are training and attendance obligations that need to be met."

# **Pedestrian Safety: Look Out**

Spring is almost here, and residents and guests of the city are enjoying the many outdoor attractions Rogers has to offer.

A quick safety reminder to all those visiting and driving through our City so we can all be mindful of laws related to pedestrians.

Minnesota law gives pedestrians the right of way at marked crosswalks and at intersections without marked crosswalks, and drivers must stop and allow pedestrians to cross the road. Pedestrians must not enter the roadway when a vehicle traveling at the posted speed limit would not be able to stop safely in time to allow them to cross the roadway. Pedestrians must also obey pedestrian control devices at intersections when they are present. Pedestrians shall travel on the left side of the roadway so approaching traffic can see them when no sidewalk is present. Never assume a driver of a vehicle sees you when you are attempting to cross at any crosswalk or intersection.

Make certain the vehicle is stopped completely before crossing the road and eye contact is made with the driver.

# 9 PM Routine

As we approach spring and summer, it is important that we remain vigilant as it relates to thefts and burglaries. The warmer weather months is when the Rogers Police Department typically sees an increase in thefts from unlocked vehicles, and burglaries from open garages and residences in the overnight hours. We developed the "9pm Routine" as a daily routine to develop a habit of keeping your valuables locked up and to prevent your residence from being a target for thieves. At 9 p.m. each night (or earlier), try to do the following:

- Remove the garage door openers out of any vehicles parked in the driveway, and ensure your vehicle(s) are locked.
- Ensure your garage door is shut, and lock the door from the garage to the residence.
- Check that the doors at your residence are locked, and windows are closed and locked when appropriate.
- Turn on your outside residence lights.



The above "9 PM routine" is a proactive way to prevent your residence from being a target for opportunistic thieves.

Most thefts and burglaries in Rogers are a result from an "opportunity" that our residents give the thieves, and rarely is there a "forced entry" theft or burglary from locked vehicles and residences. As always, if you see something suspicious, do not hesitate to call 911.



Together, we can prevent crimes of opportunity for thieves in our community and keep Rogers a wonderful city to live, work and play!

The City of Rogers has been working towards an agreement for a public/private partnership for a tennis center, since June of 2014, on the land north of the ground storage reservoir, north of the Rogers High School athletic

On September 20, 2020, a ribbon-cutting was held to commemorate the Rogers Tennis Club's opening. This is a unique publicprivate partnership that brought a high-value recreational assist to the City of Rogers and the surrounding athletic community.

Ultimate Tennis's Del Bauers said his goal for the Rogers Tennis Club is to meet the needs of all tennis players, from children to seniors.

"We'd like to be a place where kids can feel safe, and seniors can come and stay active," Bauers said. "There's something about the environment [that] we have all talked about where it feels like they're home when they come here. It's like their club. They feel welcome, and it's like a big family."
