2024 Presidential Primary Election

Important Information and Updates!

The city is preparing for the Presidential Primary Election, which will be held on March 5, 2024. Only presidential candidates from a major party will appear on the presidential primary ballot. Other offices with a primary will be on the primary ballot in August. In order to vote in the Presidential Primary, a voter must request the ballot of the party of their choice.

Registered voters can vote at their polling place on Presidential Primary day or by absentee ballot in the 46 days before Presidential Primary day (January 19 – March 4, 2024). Absentee/early voting for all Rogers residents will be held at Fire Station 1, 21201 Memorial Drive, Rogers, MN 55374. Understanding Your Property Taxes

- Adjust for tax credits, referendum levies, and state general taxes to get your property tax.

Understanding these fundamental aspects of property tax calculation can help you make informed decisions and better manage your property tax expenses. Are You Ready for the Winter Season?

Most Minnesotans are currently preparing for winter by purchasing new shovels and snow tires. Some will even gain a few extra pounds to stay warm. Simultaneously, the Rogers Public Works Department is gearing up for the winter and the snow season. Our plow routes have been updated, plows have been attached to our trucks, and salt and sand have been ordered. Each year, we purchase 800 to 1,200 tons of salt to apply to steep grades, high-volume intersections, school crossings, and icy patches on priority routes. This year, we have ten plow drivers, covering 99 miles of road and 159 cul-de-sacs between them.

The Rogers Public Works Department is committed to keeping our streets as safe as possible within staffing and budget parameters. Staff will begin plowing when snowfall reaches two inches or roadway conditions warrant a response by Public Works. Equipment dispatch depends on timing, intensity, weather forecast, personnel and equipment availability, and street priority classification. There are several things residents can do to minimize snow and plowing-related issues, which will help city crews do the most effective job possible. Here are some guidelines and winter tips.

Winter Driving Tips

Another winter driving season is just around the corner. The Rogers Police Department would like to remind you of some simple winter driving survival tips to keep you and your loved ones safe during the upcoming winter season.

Make Sure Your Vehicle is in Good Working Order

Check tire pressure, change worn-out wiper blades, check the battery condition, check fluid levels, and clean off the windshield prior to driving. These are simple things that, if not maintained properly, can cause issues or breakdowns on winter roads.

Slow Down!

Winter weather also means it is the holiday season. The City of Rogers sees a dramatic increase in traffic during the holiday season. Wet, icy, and/or snow-packed roads can easily double the distance required to stop your vehicle once you apply the brakes. Pay close attention to changing road conditions and traffic while driving. Many of us are out with friends and family and can easily become distracted while driving, so ensure you are focused on the road and not visiting or using your cell phone.

Stay in Your Vehicle

If you are involved in an accident, and it is feasible, move to a safe location and call 911. Staying inside your vehicle will be much safer than standing on the side of a roadway where other vehicles may strike you.

Carry a Simple Winter Survival Kit

A kit can be made from items you have in your home, placed in a tote, and left inside your vehicle during the winter. A shovel, blanket, first aid kit, small bag of kitty litter for tire traction, and flashlight are all essential items that can easily be stored in your vehicle in case of an emergency. Even within the city limits during severe weather, officers respond to hundreds of accidents and vehicle spinouts in a single day, and response times for assistance can be much longer than usual. Please plan accordingly and let a loved one know your plans should you travel long distances. These simple reminders will help ensure your holidays and winter travels are safe for you and others. Please be safe!

For your safety as well as the safety of others, allow ample room between your vehicle and snowplows and equipment. Wait to pass until the plow has reached a safe, clear area, and never pass on the right side of the snowplow. Always assume that intersections, curves, bridges, overpasses, and hills are slippery, and drive according to the road conditions.

Parking

Please do not park on the street during snow events. Doing so reduces the quality of snow removal and may prevent your street from being plowed at all. To assist snowplow operations and ensure public safety, the City of Rogers would like to remind residents that there is NO PARKING on any city street between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. from November 1st through March 31st. Violators may be ticketed and towed.

Driveways and Private Property

Residents and private contractors hired to clear snow from driveways, sidewalks, and parking lots may not deposit snow onto or move snow across any public street or walkway. Doing so is not only a violation of the law, it also slows down plowing operations, hampers the city's ability to plow streets and walkways full width, and creates dangerous conditions for vehicles and pedestrians.



Snow Reminders

Trash and Recycling Containers

Improper placement of trash and recycling containers reduces a plow's ability to efficiently clear streets of snow and ice. To avoid trash and recycling containers being hit or tipped over, please place them in your driveway and out of the street for collection. Plow truck operators will not stop to move the containers. Doing so would increase the time and cost of snow removal operations and pose a danger to the operators.



Snowbanks and Winter Fun

Children playing on or near the road are a concern for snowplow operators. Please discourage children from sliding from or building forts in snowbanks close to the street. Plow truck operators cannot see a child behind a snowbank or parked car.

Right-of-Way Obstructions

Trees, shrubbery, landscaping, irrigation, and other items located within the right-of-way are prone to damage by snow thrown from plows. They will not be considered for repair, replacement, or compensation. These items should be a minimum of 10 feet behind the curb line.

Mailboxes

Correct placement of your mailbox helps avoid potential damage to the mailbox during snowplowing operations. Following these guidelines will allow a snowplow blade to pass under the mailbox and in front of the post without damage.

- Mailboxes and accessory paper boxes must be mounted at least 41 inches above the road surface.
- The post should be in good condition (not rotted or rusted) and positioned so that the front of the mailbox is 6-8 inches behind the curb.

Mailboxes that are damaged by ice and snow coming off of a plow blade will not be repaired or replaced. Only properly-installed mailboxes that are physically struck by a plow blade, wing or other piece of plow equipment will be considered for repair or replacement by the City.

* Please remember to keep the area around your mailbox clear of snow to assist your postal carrier with the delivery of your mail without delay.

Thank you for your patience and cooperation as crews work to clear ice and snow from our city streets and trails safely and effectively. Depending on the timing and severity of a snow event, it may take hours or days to clear all the snow. Be safe while clearing and driving on ice and snow this winter!

Sidewalks

Residents are responsible for removing snow from sidewalks adjacent to their property. Please help neighbors who may be out of town or require assistance clearing their sidewalks. Keeping the sidewalks clear promotes safety for those using them, including children walking to school or a bus stop.

Fire Hydrants

As you shovel your driveways and sidewalks, please take the time to clear snow around fire hydrants (three-foot radius). During a fire emergency, seconds count. The extra minute it may take to remove snow around a fire hydrant may save your or your neighbor's home.

Salt Use

Melted snow and ice carry road salt and deicing chemicals through storm sewers. These sewers lead to streams, rivers, and lakes, killing fish, plants, and other aquatics. The City of Rogers has taken measures to limit the amount of salt used on our streets. The city plows curb-to-curb, applies liquid additives that enhance the salt's effectiveness, and uses equipment that applies more liquid brine and less granular salt. Approximately one teaspoon of salt pollutes five gallons of water. Once the water is polluted, it is nearly impossible to reverse it.

Know When to Use Salt

At 15 degrees or below, most salt will not work. Use sand as an alternative.

Sweep Up Leftover Salt and Sand

Sweep any remaining salt and sand from your driveway when the ice melts. You can reuse it and help reduce salt flow into storm drains and our water system.

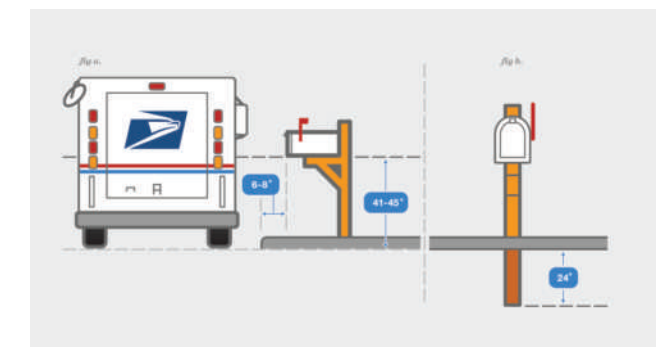

Parks and Recreation Project Updates

Lions Central Park Splash Pad

The Lions Central Park Splash Pad is a delightful water attraction at 21400 Rouillard Avenue, just a stone's throw away from downtown Rogers. This fanciful oasis officially opened its doors to the public in August 2022. This marked a significant milestone as the first project funded by Local Option Sales Tax (LOST) dollars. Since its grand opening, it has become a favorite destination for visitors of all ages, offering a refreshing and interactive water experience. Among its features are a range of water-based activities and an exhilarating bucket that generously douses you with cool water in one thrilling moment. The Splash Pad is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day. Adjacent to the splash pad, you'll discover the LCP Pavilion and the Sunroom, both available for rental to enhance your next gathering. The Sunroom boasts a spacious, climate-controlled interior with large windows providing scenic views of the park, accommodating up to 65 people with 50 chairs and six 8-foot tables. Discover the Lions Central Park Pavilion, offering a covered picnic area equipped with nine 8-foot picnic tables, two grills, a convenient serving counter, and access to electricity for a complete outdoor dining experience.

South Community Park

South Community Park is located at 12521 Main Street in downtown Rogers, immediately adjacent to Rogers Elementary School. This sprawling park, destined to span nearly 40 acres upon completion, is the twin counterpart to North Community Park. While both parks feature ballfields, multipurpose fields, and concession stands, South Community Park distinguishes itself with an array of unique amenities. This park is designed to host two outdoor hockey rinks, four youth-sized (220' outfield) ballfields, an inviting open shelter, covered dugouts, batting cages, and seasonal pickleball courts. Notably, the space previously occupied by the backstops for the Rogers Elementary ballfields is being transformed into a large open multipurpose athletic area. This versatile expanse will accommodate our youngest athletes and can be configured as two full-sized athletic fields. Most of the park's construction is slated to be completed during the upcoming summer and fall. However, the turf fields, essential for play, will not be ready until 2025. To ensure the long-term vitality of these fields, it is imperative to abstain from using the turf during its initial growth stages, as premature activity could have detrimental consequences. A local athletic field and turfgrass specialist strongly advises residents and athletic associations to respect this vital park development aspect and stay off the fields until they are officially opened. In addition to these enhancements, the city has plans to construct a maintenance building and a warming house with a concession stand in the upcoming year. South Community Park promises to be a vibrant hub for the community. It offers a wide range of recreational opportunities while prioritizing the health and sustainability of its amenities. The park will feature a rainwater harvesting and reuse irrigation system.

Site Improvements for Future Recreational Facilities

On September 28, 2021, the City Council approved a Professional Services Agreement with Anderson Engineering for engineering and surveying services for repurposing the driving range site next to the Rogers Activity Center related to the Local Option Sales Tax recreation facility improvements. The project included "pad ready" plans in preparation for the redevelopment of the Multipurpose Indoor Turf Facility and site amenities. On May 17, 2022, Terra Construction, the city's Construction Manager for the project, publicly opened and read aloud the bids for the site demolition and pad preparation. On May 24, 2022, the City Council awarded a contract to New Look Contracting for \$1,818,607 and assigned the prime contracts to Terra Construction as the city's Construction Manager. This project was completed in the Summer of 2023.

Edgewater Park Upgrades

During the summer of 2023, a hardcourt play area with a basketball court, sports net, and a globe spinner was added to Edgewater Park. This project was made possible with funds from the Park Dedication Fund and a commitment from the Edgewater Home Owners Association.

A picnic shelter, basketball court, and zipline were added during late summer and early fall at Brockton Meadows Park. Park Dedication Funds funded this project along with the area's Home Owners Association.

A significant milestone in this project was reached in September when fencing was successfully installed. This dog park currently offers two designated areas: one for small dogs and another for their larger counterparts. The thoughtful segregation ensures a safe and enjoyable experience for dogs of all sizes and their owners. Several exciting plans are in store for the future. These plans include the addition of trees to provide shade and engaging play features for our furry friends. In 2025, the park is expected to undergo further enhancements with the installation of a water source. These upcoming improvements promise to elevate the dog park into a truly exceptional space, offering a welcoming and interactive environment for both dogs and their owners.

Break-Away Hockey (Ages 4-13)

Mighty Mite (lower): Suggested for ages 6-7; typically for players with 1-2 years of hockey experience.

Super Mite (upper): Suggested for ages 7-8; typically for players moving into the last year of Mites with 2-3 years of hockey experience. Team registration is highly recommended.

Squirts: Typically for players 8-10, this is a no-checking and no-slap shot level. Team registration is highly recommended.

PeeWee: For players aged 11-13,

No checking at this level, but slap-shots are allowed. Team registration is highly recommended.

Have you never played before? Players are generally more comfortable playing at their own age level; however, the upper levels will have more hockey experience, so make sure your player is familiar with game rules and can skate well.
